GTCA Annual General Meeting

The Gorge-Tillicum Community Association (GTCA) Annual General Meeting was held on Wednesday, May 21*, 2003 at Pearkes Recreation Centre.

Guest speaker Mayor Frank Leonard entertained a good crowd with recollections of his personal connections to the Gorge-Tillicum neighbourhood. He grew up in the Northridge area, attended Mt. View and Colquitz Schools (although he confessed to sometimes playing hookey from his homework studies to frequent the "Red Lion"), and romanced his future wife, Elaine, who lived on Rockwell Avenue. He coached Little League Baseball at Hampton Park and his two children attended Esquimalt High School. He ran for Saanich Council in 1986 and won his seat.

Some highlights of Mayor Leonard's speech included the success of Saanich Recreation Centres and their increased usage, fiscal responsibility despite government cutbacks to municipal funding, the development of safety and security measures within the police, fire and ambulance services, and \$6.8 million of park acquisition spending adding 53 hectares of new parkland. Mayor Leonard also said that Saanich intends to create a new Economic Development Area for the Douglas Street corridor, with new zoning allowing mixed-use development for an area that is considered in transition. Probably the most pleasant statistic for the Mayor was that in a recent survey by the Saanich News Group, a majority of residents rated the overall quality of life in Saanich as good or very good, with O% rating it poor or very poor.

The Mayor answered questions from the audience on various issues: making Gorge Road West a "scenic parkway", the future extension of the Gorge Waterway Park under the Gorge Bridge, the possibility of another crosswalk across Gorge Road West near the new Gorge

Waterway Park, and a safe route to school for students if Hampton School is closed.

During the business portion of the meeting, President Paul Gerrard reported on some important issues that will affect the community this year, including the adoption of the Regional Growth Strategy, the Community Charter, the new Colquitz School, renovations to Pearkes Recreation Centre, expansion of Tillicum Mall, the Tillicum-Burnside Action Plan, the possible closure of Hampton School in 2004, the new playground equipment and upgrades to Taylor Park and Kosapsum Park, the aquisition of the Craigflower Manor and Schoolhouse by the Land Conservancy, and the possibility of a new library branch in the community. He also confirmed the adoption of the new GTCA Bylaws, which have been registered and are now in effect. Copies are available to members in good standing from the GTCA

A new Board of Directors was elected. Returning members Paul Gerrard, Ed Lyons, Rob Wickson, Christine Helmink, Ray Farmer and Bob June will be joined by newcomers Arden Little, Scott Murdoch and Susan Dunlop, as well as Harry Lewis and John Hoole who are returning to the Board after short breaks.

A motion was passed for the GTCA to formally adopt a small sector (in "Area 5") that has had no representation by a community association. GTCA volunteers have been delivering newsletters to the residents of this area.

Membership in the GTCA now stands at 225—the most members we have ever had. The finances are in good order, and the yearly financial statement is available to members in good standing from the Treasurer.

The final comment of the evening was to make sure to attend the Gorge Canada Day Picnic on July 1st! Refreshments were then served. By Paul Gerrard





REZONING OF 76 GORGE ROAD WEST

There is a development in our community which has caused some controversy. The property at 76 Gorge Road West has been rezoned, and a development permit issued, to construct a 12–unit apartment building on three upper levels with commercial space on the lower level. The owners of the two adjacent properties are opposed to the development on the basis of traffic volume, parking issues, and privacy concerns.

The developers and architect made two presentations to the GTCA Board in October 2002, showing the plans and design concept for the building, including the colours and materials to be used. The GTCA approved the concept of an infill development that they considered attractive and appropriate for the site, and a letter of support was written to Saanich municipality. Further to that meeting, the applicant and architect held two public meetings in the community to present their project and answer any concerns that the community may have had regarding the development. They also presented their project to the Saanich Advisory Design Panel and made changes to the building on their recommendations. Saanich Council unanimously approved the project in April, 2003.

The synopsis from the Saanich Director of Planning Services captured the feelings of the GTCA Board of Directors towards this project—that this is a creative development that fits the criteria for change in our neighbourhood. If we are to protect the urban containment boundary, then communities will have to accept suitable infill development as a reasonable alternative. This project also incorporates the intent of the Regional Growth Strategy to move communities towards increasing densities within and on the periphery of the urban containment boundary, and particularly along transportation corridors.

What is particularly appealing about this development is that the applicants are targeting a specific urbanite to live in the building who perhaps doesn't drive, uses public transit as an alternative, maybe cycles to work, wants access to our trail systems, and wants to walk to nearby services. I believe that this building fits the model of development that we are trying to attract to our neighbourhood, and is an important statement to promote in the redevelopment of the Gorge–Tillicum area. Critter Count Update

Saturday, May 31st found the Victoria team of the Georgia Strait Alliance at Bayzan Bay in their gum boots and wind breakers checking under rocks at low tide. Volunteers found lots of critters to count in the intertidal zone, adding to the database which helps monitor changes to the environmental health of our beaches.

Volunteers are still needed to help with

New Integrated Pest Management Policy For Saanich

Last October, Saanich's Environmental Advisory Committee recommended to Saanich Council that it consider endorsing the development of a Pest Management Policy for the municipality. The Committee of the Whole endorsed this initiative in principle. Subsequently, the City of Victoria and the Capital Regional District Roundtable on the Environment put forward their policies, which followed the same template. The Draft Policy for Saanich was circulated to the appropriate departments for review and comments, and was endorsed by the Parks and Recreation Committee.

On May 12th, 2003, Saanich Council adopted the policy which means Saanich will now manage vegetation and pests using integrated pest management principles and practices that: 1) minimize the risk to human health and the environment; 2) utilize site specific information to determine appropriate pest manage-

ment decisions; 3) consider the use of natural controls and alternatives to the use of pesticides, and emphasize prevention; 4) minimize the reliance on chemical controls; 5) use an ecologically responsible approach through which there is participation in the development of Natural Area Management plans that are created within the Municipality in suitable areas; 6) determine cost-effectiveness, inclusive of long-term maintenance of various public facilities and landscapes. Saanich Community Garden Policy

Saanich Council is considering a Community Garden Policy which has been proposed to enhance the viability of existing community gardens and to support the creation of new ones. The Gorge-Tillicum area does not have a community garden site. The closest to our neighbourhood is the Craigflower Community Garden on the grounds of the Craigflower Manor in View Royal, or the Cecilia Ravine Park off Burnside Road in Victoria.

Identifying possible sites cannot be undertaken without assessing the support of the neighbourhood and potential gardeners. As a result, the best approach to determining new sites is for Saanich Planning, Parks and Recreation to respond to requests from the community. If anyone is interested in pursuing this initiative, contact the GTCA, or Saanich Council will accept written opinions which can be mailed, dropped off in person, or faxed. By Paul Gerrard

PROPOSED CUT TO FUNDING OF SAANICH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLACE

On Monday, May 26th, 2003, at a Committee of the Whole meeting, Saanich Council endorsed a recommendation from Councillor Carol Pickup that Saanich write a letter to Premier Campbell expressing its grave concern with the budget cuts proposed by the Ministry of Children and Family Development which will effectively eliminate community based services in the South Vancouver Island Region.

This follows the announcement by the B.C. Ministry of Children and Family Development that it intends to cut its budget by 23% by the end of the 2004/ 2005 fiscal year.

The Municipality of Saanich provides funding for space in the Pearkes Recreation Centre for Saanich Neighbourhood Place, which uses its core funding of \$55,000 to help 300 families a year who are considered at risk, and uses this base funding to leverage other monies to run its programs.

Saanich had previously provided a letter of support (February, 2002) to the provincial government asking that core funding for Saanich Neighbourhood Place be secured.

A NEW PHASE IN THE HISTORY OF CRAIGFLOWER MANOR AND SCHOOLHOUSE

As of May 1st, 2003, TLC The Land Conservancy of British Columbia took on responsibility for the care and operation of Craigflower Manor and Schoolhouse. Usually known as TLC, The Land Conservancy is a non-profit, charitable land trust working throughout British Columbia. TLC protects areas of environmental significance as well as properties with historical, cultural, scientific, scenic or compatible recreational value.

TLC plans to interpret the Craigflower farm community of the 1850s by significantly increasing activity on the site, opening the facility to the public on a regular basis, organizing special activities and events, and working with schools to develop educational programs. Along with the Friends of Craigflower and other volunteers, TLC intends to breathe life and energy into this tremendous community asset.

The Land Conservancy prefers to work in partnership with local communities, community groups, individuals and businesses who share their passion and commitment for protecting and interpreting natural and cultural heritage. To be successful, this project will need the support and the involvement of the community and will require ongoing fundraising and financial support from many sources.

There are many volunteer opportunities, including: stewards/interpreters; gatekeepers; gift shop clerks; gardeners; housekeepers; maintenance/construction; office clerks; and volunteer coordinators.

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Local Hero

From the time of her birth in June of 1922, Ada Amelia Rose (Burt) Bone was destined to be a person who would be involved in 'making history' in her community.

Ada can trace her own ancestry back to the days of Fort Victoria. Her great-grandmother, Ruth Hayes, arrived here in 1861 with three daughters, Amelia, Selina and Kate. Amelia married Stephen Sylvester Burt who had himself come to Victoria in 1862 above the SS Tynemouth, known as the bride ship.

Ada has been a life-long resident of the Gorge–Burnside area and has always been actively involved in her community. She was a Girl Guide Captain, and for a number of years, the President and Fundraising Chairman for the PTA groups at Tillicum School.

Early in life Ada became an accomplished musician who received many awards for vocal, piano, elocution and public speaking and received a Diploma of Distinction for vocal from the Associate Board of The Royal School of Music in London, England. She was a volunteer accompanist for the Tillicum School choir.

All her life, Ada has been involved in one project or another, especially when she served for ten years as a member of Saanich's Special Events Committee under "Mr. Saanich" himself, Ken Middleton. On July 11th, 1993, she was awarded a set of

municipal-crested book ends for her service on the Special Events Committee. The gift was presented to her by former Saanich Mayor, Murray Coell, at the Strawberry Festival at Beaver Lake Park.

Ada was the main instigator for getting a pedestrian crosswalk put in at the intersection of Tillicum and Obed Roads, a project she worked on for four years.

Her most recent project has involved having the old Hampton Hall designated as a Heritage Site. This building was begun in September of 1923 and Ada worked for many months researching the building's history in order to present her case to council for its designation. At a recent council meeting, her dream came true and

the building was granted official "heritage designation". A ceremony to recognize this event was held on Sunday, May 25th.

Ada's on-going work is to make sure that the bridge often referred to as the "Tillicum Bridge" is now officially given its rightful (and original) name, the Gorge Bridge.


Ada Bone has studied and researched Victoria's history back to the city's earliest times and is proud that her roots are firmly planted here. But her strong involvement in Saanich's current community affairs and her on-going desire to fight for what needs to be done, makes her a lady of conviction who is also always looking to the future.

Determined, forthright and never bored, Ada Bone cannot understand other seniors who complain there is nothing to do when she herself is always so busy. She believes life is full of challenges and there is always something to do if you 'step up to the plate.' Aside from all her community projects, she keeps herself occupied with her family of two sons and three active grandchildren.

Of Days Gone By

This old photo of the Gorge, courtesy of the provincial archives, shows the fourth span over the narrows. It was constructed in 1882 by Daniel Adams, whose own house still stands at 2803 Adelaide Street. Visible on the Saanich shore below the bridge is the towpath that stood for many years as a safe route for boaters to get beyond the tidal rapids. Concrete footings for this boardwalk can still be found beneath today's span. The building on the left was the dance hall of the original Gorge Hotel, constructed in 1886. Advertisements of the time encouraged dancers to "take the air on the verandah from which a beautiful view of the mountain scenery is obtained"—presumably they meant the Sooke Hills just barely visible upstream. Prior to its demolition in the late 1940s, the hall also served as home to vaudeville shows, charity bake sales, political rallies, amateur theatrics, scout meetings and Saturday night basketball games. 

CANADA DAY ROAD CLOSURE ADVISORY FOR GORGE ROAD

On Tuesday, July 1st the Gorge Tillicum Community Association is hosting the 5th Gorge Canada Day Picnic, a day celebrating our country, its people, and the place we live. This event is a part of the Saanich Sunfest celebrations which are running across the municipality. It is supported by Canada Heritage and many local businesses. An integral part of the day is the closure of Gorge Road West between Tillicum and Admirals Roads. This closure has been approved by Saanich Council and is being coordinated with Saanich staff, as well as BC Transit. Following are the details of the road closure.

- Gorge Road West will be CLOSED to traffic between 8:00 AM to 6:00 PM on Tuesday July 1st between Tillicum and Admirals Roads.
- 2) Vehicle access to and from Gorge Road West properties will be for emergency purposes only.

- 3) Access to and from all sidestreets off of Gorge Road West will be by Vincent Avenue and Cowper Street.
- 4) Gorge Road residents are asked to park their cars on side streets on June 30th. No residential parking is permitted on Gorge Road West between 8:00 AM to 6:00 PM on Tuesday July 1st.
- 5) The westbound lane of Gorge Road West must be kept open for emergency vehicles.
- 6) The #10 Gorge bus service will re-route from Gorge Road West directly to and from Tillicum Centre along Tillicum Road during the road closure.

Clearly a road closure as widespread as this is asking everyone to be as understanding as possible. Rather than taking your car to escape the area we hope you will walk/bike up and down the Gorge joining your neighbours in a community celebration.
